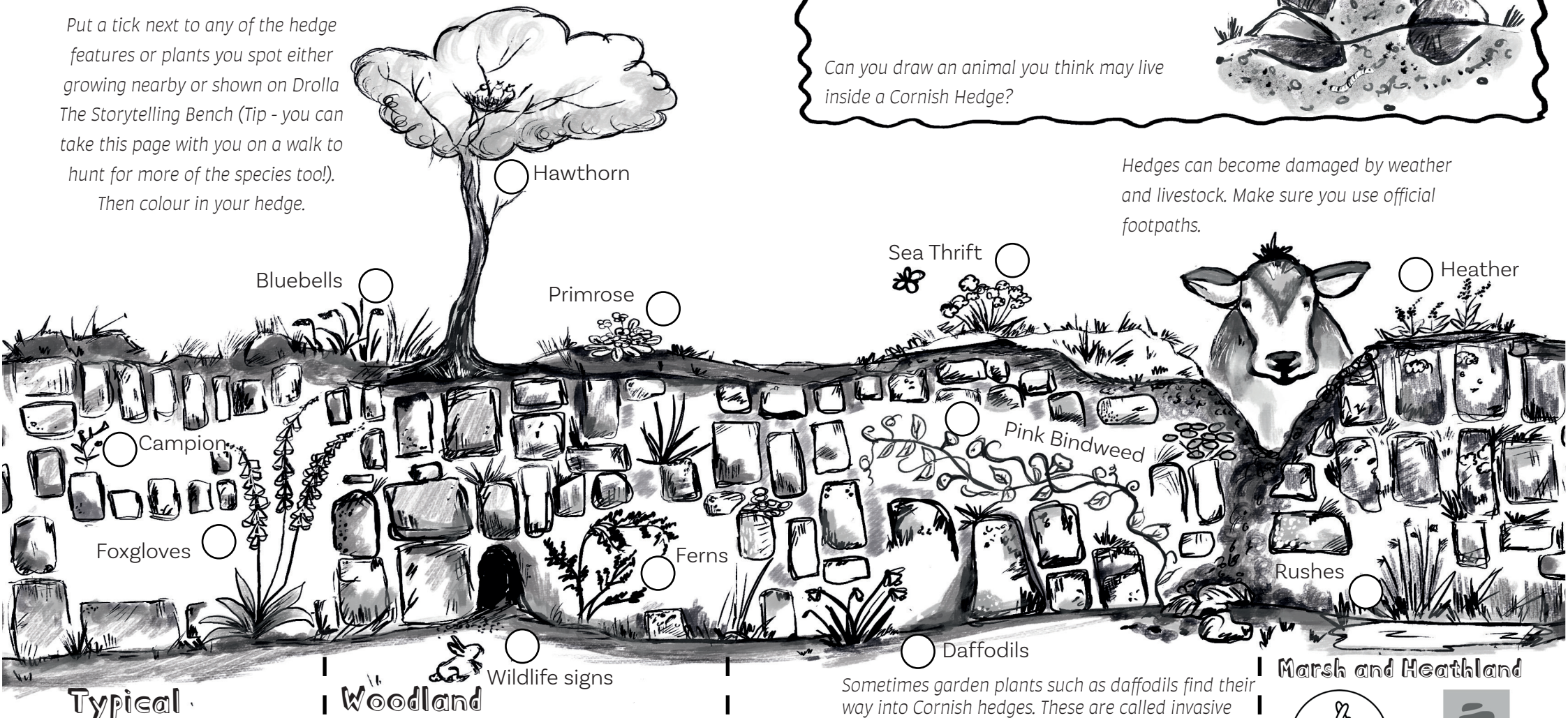


Cornish Hedges

Cornish hedges are an important part of the Cornish landscape. Their job is to divide up land, but they have become an important habitat for wildlife and plants. Many hedges have been standing for 100's or even 1000's of years and the plants found on them are different depending on the landscape they are in.

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What's inside a Cornish Hedge?

A Cornish hedge is built with stone on the outside and is filled with soil. They provide a home to many animals.

Hedges can become damaged by weather and livestock. Make sure you use official footpaths.

Sometimes garden plants such as daffodils find their way into Cornish hedges. These are called invasive plants.
